## Reported Number of Persons Living with HCV in MN




As of December 31, 2022, 2,049\* persons are assumed alive and living in St. Louis County with HCV.

- 6.3% of known HCV cases were reported as residing in St. Louis County.



# Persons Living with HCV by Gender\*, 2022






# Persons Living with HCV by Race, 2022







# **Hepatitis C**

Hepatitis C is a liver disease that is caused by being infected with the Hepatitis C virus. It is most commonly spread through exposure to blood. Hepatitis C is treatable and can be cured once it is discovered.

#### Signs & Symptoms

Many people with Hepatitis C may not experience any signs or symptoms and may not know that they have it.

If symptoms do occur, they will likely include the following:

- Jaundice (yellow-tinted eyes or
- · Loss of appetite or lack of hunger
- · Upset stomach and/or stomach pain
- Vomiting
- Fever
- · Dark colored urine
- Joint pain
- Fatigue (feeling very tired)

People living with Chronic Hepatitis C can go without showing any signs or symptoms for years. If signs do start to show, they are likely signs of a serious liver disease.

#### Risk Factors

People who engage in the following activities are more likely to contract the Hepatitis C virus:

- · Sharing injection drug equipment
- · People who encounter occupational exposure to blood
- · Having unprotected sex
- · Receiving tattoos or piercings from unlicensed people or facilities.

#### Reducing your Risk

If you fall within a high-risk group for getting Hepatitis C, you can reduce your risk of getting it by taking the following actions:



Avoid sharing injection drug equipment such



Avoid sharing personal items such as razars or toothbrushes with Hepatitis C or person who positive people.
